INTRODUCTION

Nobody gets lost on purpose. But we often find ourselves in places we never intended. If there's a disconnect between what you hope to be true in the future and the direction you're headed now, maybe it's time to take a closer look at your path. Our directions, not our intentions, determine our destinations.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- 1. Think about your favorite navigation app. If you were describing in simple terms to a new driver how to use that app, what three steps would you give them? How do those steps translate to the way we make decisions about where we go in life?
- 2. Sometimes what we consider a diversion is actually a path to a destination. Read together the parable of one young man who thought he was just taking a quick diversion.

Read Proverbs 7:6–9. How does the narrator's description of the young man help us predict where he's headed? What was the first mistake he made when he headed out?

Read Proverbs 7:21–23. The narrator compares the young man's fate to that of a trapped animal. Discuss how finding yourself on the wrong path feels similar to being trapped. How can defining your desired destination prevent you from being led into danger?

Read Proverbs 7:24–27. Identify all of the directional words in these verses. What is Solomon's specific warning? How does it apply to us today?

MOVING FORWARD
