Group is not the same as community.

The church creates groups, but you create community together.

Loving God is best demonstrated by loving people—and many times those people are different than us.

Be real. | Be curious.

There's a strong connection between being real and being curious. If we're curious about others, they're more likely to be real with us. That mutual openness and curiosity is part of community. And the church can't create that—only you can." LOVING GOD IS BEST DEMONSTRATED BY LOVING PEOPLE-AND MANY TIMES THOSE PEOPLE ARE DIFFERENT THAN US.

Tips for Sharing:



It's common for people to lose track of time when sharing their stories, so consider setting a timer for 7 minutes to keep the group moving along.



It will likely take more than one group meeting to hear everyone's story, so plan to continue sharing at your next meeting.

Suggested Outline for Sharing:

- Where are you from?
- What is something few people know about you?
- Describe your family.
- Describe your faith background.
- Describe a person or event that influenced who you are today.

Ownership is pivotal to a great group experience.

- Own your group experience.
- Own your spiritual growth.

Getting off the sidelines and joining in is what owning your group experience looks like. It will take a little time and effort—and may be a little awkward at first—but it's worth it. And if you make the effort, your group experience will be so much more worthwhile."

Helping other people grow their faith grows yours too.

 - Get to know everyone.
 - Be curious. Ask questions like, "What's going on with you this week?"
 - Offer encouragement and support in difficult times (e.g., send a text or a card, offer to bring dinner).
 - Come prepared when necessary and speak up during the discussion.

 - · Watching someone admit to and overcome a lifelong struggle
 - Encouraging a group member to live out his faith in the workplace

At this point, many groups decide if they are going to continue meeting for another study or for a set period of time. If you'd like help navigating a conversation about whether your group will continue, use the following questions.

Here are a few best practices successful groups have in common. Based on your personality or past group experiences, which stand out to you as particularly important?

Successful Groups...

- Foster Authenticity: The atmosphere should encourage openness and transparency among members. This is an environment where people should feel free to be themselves.
- **Provide Confidentiality:** In order to build authenticity, members must be able to trust that issues discussed within the group will not be shared outside the group.
- **Demonstrate Respect:** Group members never say anything that will embarrass their spouses or other members of the group.
- **Share Ownership:** Group members agree to encourage one another to participate in broad ownership of the group.
- **Stay Connected:** While prayer and discussion of the curriculum are key elements, the main emphasis of the group is on fostering relationships with one another and a relationship with Jesus.

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- **Provide Care:** Group members choose to be fully present and provide care and support for one another.
- Maintain Privacy: No guests or new members are welcome to come to the group unless all members agree to welcome the guest or add members.
- Strive for Consistency: Group members attend and participate on a regular basis.
- **End Well:** Group members recognize that groups have a life cycle. They know that it will take intentionality for a group to end well and to help one another take next steps to foster continuous spiritual growth.

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ACTIVITY: NOMINATING YOUR LEADER

- A leader doesn't always host meetings, plan socials, or set up service projects. Those are group-owned tasks shared by everyone.

- Has margin (considering other commitments like work and family)


